



BLOCK ASSEMBLY INSTRUCTIONS

General Assembly Tips of assembling a Nacnad Block

We have six different sized blocks named; quarter, half, one, two, three and four blocks. The quarter and half blocks are available as assembled pieces while the one, two, three and four blocks come in either of two ways, flat pack for easy carrying in any vehicle or already assembled blocks.

These tips are when you get the blocks not assembled.

1. Orientation: Always ensure grooves face inward and door holes face towards the front of the block.
2. Panel Identification: Use the size, and specific features (like holes and grooves) to identify the correct panels.
3. Sequencing: A general sequence is:
 - Attach top and bottom panels to side panels.
 - Attach the back panel.
 - For two, three and four blocks, attach separating panels last.

M6 screws of 2 inches are used to attach a panel to the other

ONE BLOCK

Top panel



4 middle holes, 2 back panel holes and 2 French cleat holes which should be at the back of the panel

Bottom panel



16 middle holes with t-nuts and 2 back panel holes which should be at the back of the panel

Right panel



4 middle holes, 6 top and bottom panel holes, 2 back panel holes and 1 French cleat hole which should be at the back of the panel

Left panel



4 middle holes with t-nuts, 6 top and bottom holes, 2 back panel holes and 1 French cleat hole which should be at the back of the panel

Back panel



One block assembly



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TWO BLOCK

Top panel



8 middle holes, 2 separating panel holes, 4 back panel holes and 4 French cleat holes which should be at the back of the panel

Bottom panel



20 middle holes with t-nuts, 2 separating panel holes and 4 back panel holes which should be at the back of the panel

Right panel



4 middle holes, 6 top and bottom panel holes, 2 back panel holes and 1 French cleat hole which should be at the back of the panel


4 middle holes with t-nuts, 6 top and bottom holes, 2 back panel holes and 1 French cleat hole which should be at the back of the panel

THREE BLOCK

Top panel



12 middle holes, 4 separating panel holes, 6 back panel holes and 6 French cleat holes which should be at the back of the panel

Bottom panel



24 middle holes with t-nuts, 6 separating panel holes and 6 back panel holes which should be at the back of the panel

Right panel



4 middle holes, 6 top and bottom panel holes, 2 back panel holes and 1 French cleat hole which should be at the back of the panel


4 middle holes with t-nuts, 6 top and bottom holes, 2 back panel holes and 1 French cleat hole which should be at the back of the panel

4 separating panel holes and 2 French cleat hole

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FOUR BLOCK

Top panel



16 middle holes, 6 separating panel holes, 8 back panel holes and 8 French cleat holes which should be at the back of the panel

Bottom panel



40 middle holes with t-nuts, 6 separating panel holes and 8 back panel holes which should be at the back of the panel

Right panel



4 middle holes, 6 top and bottom panel holes, 2 back panel holes and 1 French cleat hole which should be at the back of the panel


4 middle holes with t-nuts, 6 top and bottom panel holes, 2 back panel holes and 1 French cleat hole which should be at the back of the panel

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Attaching Blocks Together

- Modularity: Nacnad blocks can be attached side-by-side, stacked, or back-to-back.
- Fastening: Screws of about 1.5 inch will be used to secure blocks together.

Nacnad blocks and accessories are basically your cabinet, bed, TV stand, bookshelf or any other furniture made in smaller pieces. In their smaller sizes, they are modular that they can be built together in different ways and reconfigured to make different furniture pieces. Their dimensions allow for clever layouts and are stackable.

Modularity allows Nacnad blocks to be built in endless ways and lets you adapt storage to your space, allowing you to build a low unit with a single block, a cupboard with three storeys, or a huge library bookshelves. Start small with a single block to create a bedside table and scale up to a room divider with hundreds of blocks.



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
